- **Mission and Outreach Ministry Budget.** Currently this is a ministry of giving financial support to a variety of ministries. What guidelines do we use for making these allocations?
- **Personal giving recommendations.** Particularly during the pandemic many of us are not spending resources that we might have otherwise in travel, entertainment, etc. This is an area where individual members could examine their giving and direct resources to places having an impact on racism.

V. WE WILL TAKE ACTION AND BUILD RELATIONSHIPS THROUGH THE MINISTRIES OF DUMC

<u>Washington Interfaith Network</u>- Continue to engage, take action and support

WIN's Issue Agenda includes: black equity through homeownership; affordable housing; building generational wealth; fair wage green jobs, supporting public transit; sustainable wages; safe communities with net zero homicides.

Georgetown Ministry Center - Continue to engage, take action and support financially

GMC addresses poverty and homelessness through following services: showers, washers and dryers and meals (provided to hundreds of people each year) plus additional services

Dumbarton Pop Up Café – continue to sponsor/provide Saturday morning opportunity primarily for unhoused population of Georgetown to find fellowship and resources in DUMC's Fellowship Hall.

VI. WE WILL CONTINUR OUR RELATIONSHIP WITH MOUNT ZION UMC – continue to nurture and build

- through joint worship and joint study e.g. recently concluded joint book study, *Reading While Black*
- join study through joint action related to Mt. Zion Cemetery
- Continue wonderful series of Guest Preachers from Mt. Zion and from other Black traditions

VII. WE WILL FORGE NEW RELATIONSHIPS

Engage with a majority-Black congregation and a majority-Hispanic and/or Asian American congregation in the Washington area to identify practical actions Dumbarton UMC can take together with them. We imagine pursuing a common priority, and in the process forging new relationships. Such actions may include, for example: community-based service and compassion ministries; joining together in a public march or assembly for human or voting rights; holding jointly-led Bible studies; or forming educational groups to discuss movies, podcasts, or other works on anti-racism.

VI. WE WILL CONTINUE TO UNDERTAKE LEGISLATIVE INITIATIVES

Continue to inform congregation and to respond

Initiate alliances with antiracist organizations advocating antiracist legislative policies at the local, district, state, and national level. Determine in coordination with these allies which pieces of legislation Dumbarton UMC will publicly advocate for.
